This will comprise an Art Exhibition showcasing local artists in a weekend of events, including; a showing of the film Loving Vincent, printing workshops, an arts café and exhibiting some of the work created through the Young Arts programme.

As a reprimand, his superiors send him to the most remote school in the world, a glacial Himalayan village called Lunana, to complete his service. The film had its world premiere at the BFI London Film Festival. It was a nominee for Best International Feature Film at the 94th Academy Awards.

An update from The Salisbury Museum's £5 million development

Construction work is now well underway on the Past Forward project. The first stage of the work involved the complete strip-out of the old displays which was completed by the end of March 2023. This has revealed spaces, windows and walls that have been hidden for over 40 years – and has already begun to show what a vast improvement the new museum galleries and spaces will be.

To get to this point the museum had to completely empty most of the displays and stores on the northern side of the building. Three galleries have been completely stripped of about 3,000 objects and safely packed away. Three stores have also been emptied and over 2,000 boxes either stored elsewhere in the King's House or at our off-site store. All of this was done inhouse by staff with support from our volunteers which is an amazing achievement. The Salisbury Giant pageant figure has been left in situ – safely boxed up in readiness for him to be moved to his new position later this year.

As well as substantial restoration of the building, new developments will include:

The Devenish Bradshaw Salisbury Gallery: Spanning three of the museum's principal ground floor spaces, This new gallery will tell Salisbury's story from 1220 to the present.

Ceramics Gallery: The gallery in the King's Room will be refurbished and our collection used to tell a 'potted history' of ceramics in Britain.

Natural History Gallery: The museum's collection of natural history, currently in long-term storage, will be displayed to explore issues of bio-diversity and climate change.

Learning Space: A hub for learning at the museum and for activities ranging from object handling to craft workshops.

Event Space: A reconfigured first floor gallery will become a superb venue for lectures, courses and community meetings.

Conservation of the Building: Work has been successfully undertaken to the 17th century King's Room ceiling. Windows have been removed and replacement stonework is on order. Huge sections of tile have been removed to allow for work to the timber structure of the roof.

In terms of community engagement, the museum continues to deliver a range of sessions for groups ranging from pre-school to young adults. These include our Young Producers who are a group of young people who meet weekly to help inform the new displays. Their work has included choosing the characters that visitors can dress up as in the new Salisbury Gallery, and creating text and stories that will bring these characters to life. We have also been running a programme of history workshops with residents of the Friary exploring the medieval history of the area. Their work will feed directly into the Salisbury Gallery.

Our formal educational work has included two large scale secondary school projects – one working with year ten at Sarum Academy on how museums and local history can be a resource for their artwork, the second at Salisbury Sixth Form College looking at the curatorial process and creating mini exhibitions inspired by local history. During the building works the museum's archaeology and temporary exhibition galleries will remain open. The rest of the museum will be partially closed throughout 2023 with the capital works and exhibition fit out due to be finished by the end of the year. Objects will be installed at the beginning of 2024 with the new museum opening at the end of May 2024.

Everyone at the museum very much looks forward to welcoming you and showing you these fantastic developments.

'Recycle 4 Wiltshire Air Ambulance' are grateful for all support so feel free to get your friends and family involved. This is a great scheme for anyone to be able to contribute to supporting the work of the Wiltshire Air Ambulance and recycle waste which would otherwise be put in the bin.
